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Anthroposophical Society in America

As we move through our day and ponder what we see and hear, it is easy to conclude that all is not right with the world. Our foundational structures – economic, health, environmental, social – reflect a loss of humane values. Many wonder if humanity has the courage and imagination to evolve new forms.

Inspired by the work and the vision of Rudolf Steiner a century ago, anthroposophists seek to engage the better nature and higher potentials of the human being. In terms Steiner used as a young man, this involves our becoming not just knowers (“critics”) or doers (“activists”), but “the one who matters most of all: the knowing doer” – the thoughtful helper, the caring researcher, the conscious human being.

Rudolf Steiner developed his own remarkable abilities into *anthroposophy*, or *the consciousness of our humanity*, a body of resources to support the healthy growth of individuals and the evolution of a humane global civilization. In the USA, the non-profit, non-sectarian Anthroposophical Society in America works to further this vision. Through more intimate personal reflection and study, group collaboration in research and community building, and devoted service to others, members try to become the change humanity needs, each according to her or his conscience and inspiration. “People must come closer to one another than they used to do,” Steiner observed, “each becoming an awakener of everyone he or she meets.”

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
